3. Favoring Corporations:

• **Non-Auction Allocation:** Provisions allowing non-auction allocation of satellite spectrum and regulatory sandboxes may favor large corporations, potentially raising concerns about market fairness.

4. Lack of Transparency and Debate:

• **Rapid Passage:** The swift passage of the Bill through Parliament without thorough debate and scrutiny has been criticized. Opposition objections, suspension of members, and dismissal of requests for detailed examination raise concerns about transparency.
